### Vines by Scientific Name

Scientific Name	Common Name	Comments
<p><b>Akebia quinata</b></p> 	Fiveleaf Akebia	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Semi-evergreen/deciduous vine</li> <li>• 5 leaflets (Latin: <i>quintus</i>)</li> <li>• Light rose-purple flowers typically lost in foliage</li> <li>• Aggressive twining vine</li> <li>• Sun or shade</li> </ul>
<p><b>Bignonia capreolata</b></p> 	Crossvine	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Semi-evergreen, native vine</li> <li>• Climbs by twining and tendrils</li> <li>• Beautiful trumpet shaped flowers in April, orange/yellow/red with darker tube</li> </ul>
<p><b>Campsis radicans</b></p> 	Common Tumpet creeper	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Vigorous, deciduous vine</li> <li>• Climbs by root-like holdfasts</li> <li>• Beautiful tubular, orange/red flowers in summer</li> <li>• Fruit pod (capsule) 5 to 8" long</li> <li>• sun</li> </ul>
<p><b>Celastrus scandens</b></p> 	Bittersweet	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Deciduous vine</li> <li>• Climbs by twining (requires support)</li> <li>• Flowers not showy</li> <li>• Fruit showy (dioecious); frequently used in dried flower arrangements</li> <li>• Sun</li> </ul>
<p><b>Clematis hybrids</b></p> 	Clematis	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Deciduous vine</li> <li>• Twining vine (requires support)</li> <li>• Known for beautiful, large flowers; white, pink, purple in May</li> <li>• Keep roots shaded and moist</li> </ul>

<p><b>Ficus pumila</b></p> 	<p>Creeping Fig; Climbing Fig</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Broadleaf evergreen vine</li> <li>• Climbs by aerial rootlets (attaches to structures)</li> <li>• Zone 8 (7)</li> <li>• Juvenile: leaves smaller and cling tighter to wall; adult: leaves larger, plant sticks out further, flowers and fruits</li> <li>• Sun or shade</li> </ul>
<p><b>Gelsemium sempervirens</b></p> 	<p>Carolina Jasmine</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Broadleaf evergreen vine</li> <li>• Climbs by twining (requires support)</li> <li>• Showy yellow flowers in February/March</li> <li>• Best flowering in full sun</li> </ul>
<p><b>Lonicera japonica *</b></p> 	<p>Japanese Honeysuckle</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Semi-evergreen vine/ground cover in Arkansas</li> <li>• White flowers in late spring; black berry</li> <li>• Climbs by twining</li> <li>• Invasive; avoid using in landscapes</li> </ul>
<p><b>Lonicera sempervirens</b></p> 	<p>Trumpet Honeysuckle</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Deciduous vine</li> <li>• Spectacular tubular, yellow or yellow/orange or red flowers in April; great for hummingbirds</li> <li>• Twining vine</li> </ul>
<p><b>Parthenocissus quinquefolia</b></p> 	<p>Virginia Creeper</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Deciduous vine</li> <li>• Climbs by adhesive tendrils (sticks to structures)</li> <li>• Maroon fall color</li> <li>• Sun or shade</li> <li>• Quinquefolia = 5 leaflets (Latin: <i>quintus</i>)</li> </ul>
<p><b>Parthenocissus tricuspidata</b></p> 	<p>Boston Ivy</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Deciduous vine</li> <li>• Climbs by root-like holdfasts</li> <li>• Maroon fall color</li> <li>• Latin: <i>tricuspidata</i> = '3 lobes'</li> </ul>

<p><b>Trachelospermum jasminoides</b></p>  	<p>Confederate Jasmine</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Broadleaf evergreen ground cover/vine (requires support for vine)</li> <li>• Glossy, dark green leaves</li> <li>• Showy, white stars in April/May</li> <li>• Zone 8</li> </ul>
<p><b>Vitis sp.</b></p>  	<p>Grape</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Deciduous vine</li> <li>• Full sun</li> <li>• Twining vine (requires support)</li> <li>• Edible fruits</li> </ul>
<p><b>Wisteria sp.</b></p>   	<p>Wisteria</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Deciduous vine</li> <li>• Spectacular, fragrant purple (or white) flower panicles in April</li> <li>• Twining vine (requires support)</li> </ul>

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
